Proposals are due by 11:59 PM (MST) on May 16, 2025

The National Transportation in Indian Country Conference (NTICC) is planned and organized by The Center for Tribal Transportation (CTT) staff and a Planning Committee comprised of Tribal transportation professionals from Tribes and Tribal organizations across the United States. The 2025 NTICC estimates there will be 700+ Tribal transportation professionals, and Federal, State and County representatives.

SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

Be Clear

- Ensure that your submission reflects what will be included in your presentation. Attendees sign up for sessions based on the description of each session.

Be Enthusiastic

- Present content that's both relevant and exciting. Demonstrate to the attendees why the information you are sharing is valuable.

Be Specific

- Identify your target audience and the roles that will specifically benefit from the session. Make sure your presentation stays on topic and relevant to the session.

Be Original

- Attendees want to see new presentations that cover the latest innovations in Tribal transportation. Write well-written, eye catching titles and descriptions.

Be Educational

- Use your presentation to education rather than promote. Ensure that your presentation proposal is an exciting opportunity for attendees to learn something new, instead of appearing as a sales pitch.

QUICK GUIDE TO SUBMITTING A SESSION PROPSAL

The NTICC Planning Committee, along with CTT staff, evaluates all proposals submitted for the conference. The information that you include in your submission will be used by the reviewers to understand your proposal and what the proposed session will offer attendees, help NTICC market your session, and help attendees find the sessions most relevant to them.

Session Title:

A brief and descriptive explanation of your session.

Session Description:

Provide a 250-word description of your session include a summary of the topic and of the information, takeaways, benefits, or lessons that you expect attendees to gain. This is the primary element of your proposal that the reviewers will use to evaluate your session. If your session is accepted, you will be asked to provide a refined 50-word summary for the conference program and marketing materials.

Session Leaders and Presenters:

The accurate names, titles, organizations, and contact information for the people presenting in the session, that includes a list of ALL panel members, and any others that you deem as a presenter. For each session give a FULL LIST of all presenters.

Conference Track:

One of eight conference tracks that best describes the major content focus of your session and will be used to help attendees find the content most relevant for them.

Target Audience:

One of the four audience “levels” that describes the target audience for your session: early career, mid-career, experienced, Tribal leadership. Audiences will be used by evaluaters to help determine the mix of sessions for attendees at the conference and will be used by attendees to find sessions most appropriate for their proccessional development.

Session Format:

The session format should be designed to provide the experience and the takeaways desired for your intended audience. Make clear what kind of interaction and engagement will be provided in you session content. The format will help set expectations for what attendees will experience.

PROPOSAL TYPES

General Session Presentation:

This presentation is in the morning and to all attendees. These presentations range from 1 - 2 hours.

90 Minute Session Presentation:

This is an in-dept presentation on one of the eight session tracks.

- **Lecture** - standard instructor/speaker delivers information to attendees.
- **Panel** - a session with 3-7 four presenters in a moderated panel discussion, followed by 15-20 minutes of questions and answers.
- **Certifications** - where attendees can leave with a certification.
