

Why Tribal Pedestrian Safety is Critical






U.S. pedestrian deaths (2010-2022)







Next Steps



An Indigenous Pathway to Health Equity: Community-Based Participatory Transportation Planning

To improve health equity in Tribal communities, this project will challenge the structural racism in U.S. planning and traffic engineering systems that has excluded Native voices. Grounded in Indigenous knowledge, the methodology will support Tribes in leading grassroots, hands-on approaches to community safety through addition of pedestrian infrastructure and traffic calming. Workshops, peer learning, and creation of a resource library will build community capacity to create safe and just mobility systems that will protect future generations. By piloting community "quickbuilds" and coordinating a policy-focused national network of advocates and professionals, the project will advance Tribal self-determination in transportation and health.
